



Tyrell Haberkorn received funding for the 112 Project, an initiative of the Justice in Southeast Asia Lab in the Center for Southeast Asian Studies at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, with generous support from the Anonymous Fund.

The 112 Project responds to a lacuna between the increasing use of Article 112 to suppress peaceful expression in Thailand and the lack of scholarship and awareness of these restrictions outside Thailand. The project will expand scholarship and public engagement through translation, research-led undergraduate and graduate teaching and collaboration with relevant U.S., Thai, and international scholars and non-governmental organizations.


